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AN ACT TO ADD A NEW CHAPTER 77A TO DIVISION 3, TITLE 10, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO SUPPORTING HIRING ACTIVITIES BY GUAM LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES EXPERIENCING INCREASED COMPETITION FOR HIRING AND DIFFICULTY WITH RETENTION, TO BE KNOWN AS THE "COMPREHENSIVE CRYSTAL METH PREVENTION AND IMPROVED LAW ENFORCEMENT AND SAFETY ACT OF 2023."

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM: 1 Section 1. A new Chapter 77A is added to Division 3, Title 10, Guam Code 2 3 Annotated to read: "CHAPTER 77A 4 THE COMPREHENSIVE CRYSTAL METH PREVENTION AND 5 IMPROVED LAW ENFORCEMENT AND SAFETY ACT OF 2023 6 § 77A001. Title. 7 § 77A002. Legislative Findings and Intent. 8 9 § 77A003. Definitions.

6	§ 77A001. Title. This Chapter shall be cited as "The Comprehensive
7	Crystal Meth Prevention and Improved Law Enforcement and Safety Act of
8	<u>2023"</u>
9	§ 77A002. Legislative Findings and Intent. I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds
10	that the usage and distribution of the schedule 2 stimulant, methamphetamine, or
11	"crystal meth" has reached unprecedented levels in Guam. The island of Guam is
12	awash with the illegal substance. Addiction is rampant and the supply chain seems
13	to be growing stronger despite all efforts to prevent the drug's importation and usage.
14	Local Customs and Law enforcement are overwhelmed, regardless of the Federal
15	Government's assistance. The price of crystal meth on the streets is decreasing and
16	its availability is increasingly unhindered. This drug crisis is prefaced by a lack of
17	inspectors at the Customs and Quarantine Agency as well as peace officers in the
18	drug enforcement agency of the Guam Police Department. With the shortage of
19	public safety personnel, communities across the island of Guam are paying the price
20	of an under-staffed workforce. Since local peace officers are unable to carry out their
21	duty effectively, Guam has seen record heights in drug distribution and crimes,
22	specifically distribution and crimes related to meth.
23	I Liheslaturan Guåhan believes that a multi-pronged and comprehensive
24	approach must be undertaken immediately. The Customs and Quarantine Agency
25	(CQA) needs more inspectors at the Port Authority of Guam and the Guam
26	International Airport Authority. More inspections must be conducted if we are to
2.7	intercept and prevent drugs from reaching the streets of Guam, Likewise, the Guam

Police Department (GPD) needs experienced drug enforcement detectives and 1 2 investigators, and GPD needs them now. More officers dedicated to locating and 3 stopping meth will ensure that GPD is more effective and efficient in narcotics enforcement. Additionally, drug interdiction on Guam will be increasingly 4 5 successful with the acquisition of more K-9 Unit dogs to assist our law enforcement. 6 I Liheslaturan Guåhan further finds that both the Customs and Quarantine 7 Agency and the Guam Police Department face substantial challenges in recruiting, hiring, and retaining personnel. The struggle to hire and keep qualified staff has 8 hindered both Government of Guam law enforcement entities from sufficiently 9 fulfilling their mission, thus significantly impacting the public safety of Guam. 10 Customs and Quarantine has to rival the pay of other Federal Agencies who snatch 11 personnel from the Agency upon the completion of training. Whereas, the Guam 12 13 Police Department not only struggles with retainment, but also has to recruit qualified personnel. Waiting for the natural training and learning cycles of both GPD 14 and CQA officers to occur will not yield enough interested and prepared staff. 15 Simply employing and training new recruits in law enforcement isn't adequate 16 enough to fill the need that is securing our island and stopping the drug importation 17 and distribution of methamphetamine. Only by recruiting outside of the Guam Police 18 Department and the Customs and Quarantine Agency can enough trained and 19 experienced officers be installed and activated. Our public safety offices must be 20 given the resources to hire and retain enough seasoned officers to be able to make 21 an impact in the ever-growing crisis of crystal methamphetamine on Guam. The 22 need for trained drug enforcement officers and detectives is undeniable and the both 23 GPD and CQA must be given the ability to hire competitively if we are to effectively 24 and efficiently beat the methamphetamine plague. 25 I Liheslaturan Guåhan further finds that increasing the salary and ensuring a 26 competitive pay with benefits for experienced personnel with suitable qualities for 27

the job not only guarantees applicants, it secures retention. In order for our island to cultivate and maintain a safe, thriving community, the recruitment, hiring, and retention of the best law enforcement officers is critical. These increased salaries shall be for both CQA and GPD to immediately hire and retain experienced and properly trained officers and activate them immediately in the mission of stopping and preventing the importation and distribution of meth.

I Liheslaturan Guåhan further finds that the success of drug interdiction depends on both the expertise of human personnel and the skills of drug detection dogs. These specially trained canines can be used to detect drugs on individuals, within buildings, open areas, and vehicles. The services provided by these dogs are invaluable to drug enforcement as they can sniff scents hidden beneath layers of materials, objects, and among other odors. They can bypass multiple smells and locate the desired target. However, these canines need to be treated properly and cared for, in a similar way to hired human personnel. Consequently, it is the purpose of this legislation to improve the efficiency of our local drug investigations and ensure that law enforcement on Guam has access to healthy, operational, and adequately trained and maintained canines in a K-9 unit to be utilized by the Guam Police Department.

I Liheslaturan Guåhan therefore intends to invest in our local law enforcement officers and support the massive undertaking that is keeping our communities safe by addressing these insufficiencies and hereby authorizing the Director of the Department of Administration to increase the salary and benefits to incentivize seasoned personnel from other federal agencies and the like on Guam, to be recruited and retained under the Customs and Quarantine Agency or the Guam Police Department, and to also further support our law enforcement by allocating resources for a K-9 unit to aid in all drug enforcement efforts conducted by the Guam

Police Department.

1	§ 77A003	3. Definitions. For the purposes of this section, the term:
2	a.	"Experienced or Seasoned Personnel" shall mean personnel with a
3		minimum of five (5) years of knowledge and direct practice in the
4		field of drug detection, enforcement, and prevention, and a
5		minimum total of ten (10) years of experience in law enforcement.
6	b.	"K-9 Unit" shall mean the office or section in which a law
7		enforcement organization facilitates its canine enforcement program
8		utilizing healthy, operational canines with certified drug interdiction
9		training received at an acceptably certified canine training school
10		which meets or exceeds U.S. K-9 national standards, as determined
11		by the appointing authority.
12	c.	"K-9 Support Personnel" shall mean the certified staff needed to
13		train, maintain, and handle the canines in the K-9 unit.
14	d.	"K-9 Facility" shall mean the premises and buildings required to
15		house, train, and maintain the K-9 unit.
16	§ 77A	004. Customs and Quarantine Agency Inspectors. The Customs
17	and Quarantine	e Agency is hereby authorized to hire twelve (12) experienced
18	inspectors to im	mediately increase the Agency's ability to conduct inspections at the
19	port and the air	port.
20	a.	These inspector positions shall be permanent classified positions
21		with the starting annual salary of Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$60,000).
22	b.	The seasoned personnel hired for these positions shall be dedicated
23		to preventing the importation of crystal meth and other dangerous
24		drugs coming into our territory.
25	c.	Customs and Quarantine Inspectors hired under this Act shall not be
26		subject to reassignment until the Director of Customs and

1	Quarantine certifies that the crystal methamphetamine plague on
2	Guam has been eliminated or the Legislature amends this Act.
3	§ 77A005. Guam Police Department Drug Prevention Officers.
4	a. The Guam Police Department is hereby authorized to hire five (5)
5	experienced drug investigators and or detectives.
6	1. These officer positions shall be permanent classified positions with
7	the starting salary of Eighty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$85,000.00)
8	2. The personnel hired for these positions shall be dedicated to the
9	prevention and investigation of crystal methamphetamine.
10	3. Guam Police Department Drug Prevention Officers hired under this
11	Act shall not be subject to reassignment until the Chief of Police
12	certifies that the crystal methamphetamine plague on Guam has
13	been eliminated or the Legislature amends this Act.
14	b. The legislature also allocates immediate additional funding, as set forth
15	in § 77A007(b), to acquire equipment and other necessary support to allow
16	these five (5) additional officers and the current drug prevention staff at
17	the Guam Police Department to do their work.
18	§ 77A006. GPD K-9 Unit. The legislature hereby allocates One Million
19	Dollars (\$1,000,000.00), as set forth in § 77A007(c), to ensure that law enforcement
20	on Guam has access to healthy, operational, and certified narcotics detection canines
21	in a K-9 unit to be utilized by the Guam Police Department. The allocation under
22	this provision shall be for:
23	a. The Acquisition of K-9 Unit Canines:
24	i. with narcotics detection training and experience in the field; and
25	ii. with a minimum age of two (2) years but a maximum age of five
26	(5) years.
27	b. Hiring K-9 Support Staff and Personnel including:

1		i. Certified Canine Handlers, Officers, or other support positions
2		who shall work alongside the canines and care for the canines when
3		they are not on duty with a law enforcement agency; and
4		ii. the resources needed for the support staff and personnel to
5		continue training and handling K-9 Unit canines.
6	c.	The Acquisition of Resources including, but not limited to:
7		i. Molle (modular light-weight load-carrying equipment) gear,
8		harnesses & vests, leashes, collars, muzzles, electric collars,
9		tracking gear, detector dog gear, protection equipment; and
0		ii. Dietary and nutrition resources required to sustain and nourish
1		the canines in the K-9 Unit; and
12		iii. The necessary materials needed to outfit patrol cars required to
13		accommodate transporting K-9 Unit canines; and
14		iv. The continuous medical preventive and primary healthcare for
15		the K-9 Unit canines; and
16	d.	The establishment of facilities needed to continue training K-9 Unit
17		canines.
18	§ 77A00	7.Appropriation. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, for
19	Fiscal Year 202	24, the following sums are appropriated to:
20	a.	Customs and Quarantine. The sum of seven hundred and twenty
21	<u>th</u>	ousand dollars (\$720,000.00) is appropriated from the General Fund
22	fo	r the sole purpose of hiring twelve (12) additional inspectors to be
23	sta	ationed at the Port Authority of Guam and the Guam International
24	<u>A</u> :	irport Authority.
25	b.	Guam Police Department.
26		1. The sum of Four Hundred and Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars

1	(\$425,000.00) is appropriated from the General Fund for the sole
2	purpose of hiring five (5) experienced law enforcement officers
3	dedicated to the prevention and investigation of crystal
4	methamphetamine and other such drugs at the Guam Police
5	Department.
6	2. The sum of Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000.00) is
7	appropriated from the General Fund for the sole purpose of
8	acquiring equipment and the necessary support needed to allow
9	these five (5) additional officers and the current drug prevention
10	staff at the Guam Police Department to do their work.
11	c. GPD K-9 Unit. The sum of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) is
12	appropriated from the General Fund for the sole purpose of
13	acquiring canine detection dogs and their support staff and facilities.
14	This K-9 Unit shall be utilized by the Guam Police Department for
15	the interdiction of crystal methamphetamine and other drugs on
16	island.
17	§ 77A008. Severability. If any provision of this Act or its application to any
18	person or circumstance is found to be invalid or inorganic, such invalidity shall not
19	affect other provisions or applications of this Act that can be given effect without
20	the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this Act are
21	severable."

Section 2. Effective Date. This Act shall be effective upon enactment.
